Dear friends

W S Gilbert was a keen observer of human nature and his words still resonate almost 150 years on from when they were written. In *Iolanthe*, Private Willis observes that, when a vote happens in Parliament, the MPs have to leave their brains outside and vote as they are told to vote, while, when Strephon enters Parliament, he carries every bill he wishes and no-one refuses. In 2003, a ministerial reshuffle and significant changes in the machinery of government were announced by the Prime Minister, which included the abolition of the role of Lord Chancellor. It became almost immediately apparent that this could not be done by way of a ministerial shuffle. Gilbert would have had a field day with that!

I hope you enjoy the performance.

performed at Carnegie Hall, Dunfermline Thursday–Saturday 22–24 February 2024

The story of *lolanthe* takes a satirical dig at the assumed power of parliament and how MPs respond to a challenge from a band of more liberal-minded fairies. Without delving too much into the politics of the 1880s, there are worrying reflections in the story of many of the antics of recent governments, nevertheless we hope that you enjoy our version of this much-loved operetta!

Our Director this year is Michael Scott. This is his first show with us as Director and, to emphasise just how enthusiastic Michael is for the production, he is also taking the part of the Lord Chancellor.

It is our good fortune to have Elaine Young with the Society as the Queen of the Fairies, the major adversary to the Lord Chancellor. She appeared with the Society in last year's production of *The Pirates of Penzance* amongst the bold police, but this year she leads the fairies into battle against the peers of the realm.

Amongst the newcomers to the Society, we welcome David Thomson, who plays the part of young Strephon, and Caroline Warburton in the title role of Iolanthe. Mike Enright is promoted from the chorus to the military, puts on a soldier's uniform as Private Willis, and sets the scene in Act II.

Eddie MacLennan is our Musical Director once again. What would we do without the superb orchestral accompaniment for our singers that Eddie and his brilliant musicians provide!

lolanthe was first performed in November 1882 and made theatrical history by becoming the first play or opera ever to open simultaneously in Britain and the United States on the same night. It was also the first show to premiere in the Savoy Theatre just off the Strand in London. Here, under new electric lighting, another first in London, it ran for 396 performances.

Sets for this opera have frequently been very grand, with large silvery cobwebs in an Arcadian setting right through to a grandiose second act depicting an elaborate House of Lords. Tonight's show is set in less sumptuous surroundings! We find ourselves in a village hall in the little-known village of Thanolie where the caretaker and cleaner are getting ready for a dancing class, whose members will be dancing to a Sullivan tune. The mothers who arrive to collect them think they would like to recapture their youth and 'take wing', so to speak. A little later, the married couple who run the local band and cricket club arrive separately to find that their hall bookings have clashed ... fortunately their members are happy to join the topsy-turvey world that's been created. It's faithful to Sullivan's music, though a few liberties have been taken with Gilbert's words in the interests of emphasising the currency of the plot and the humour. We are sure that you will enjoy our very different production of *Iolanthe*!



The story of Iolanthe

Act I

The curtain rises on the village hall in Thanolie where a dance school, the Women's Institute, the village band and the cricket team have all booked meetings for the same evening. How this develops into our story you will soon discover!

The fairies take the stage first and they summon lolanthe from her watery banishment. We learn that her punishment for marrying a mortal was pretty severe and, to cap it all, she has a son, Strephon, who is half fairy and half mortal.

We then meet Strephon, who announces his intention to marry Phyllis, a shepherdess, who is also a Ward-in-Chancery. Strephon is very disconsolate as the Lord Chancellor has not consented to the marriage, but the Fairy Queen promises her assistance. Phyllis and Strephon hesitate no longer and vow to marry.

The peers enter, and the main concern of the day is which of them will be lucky enough to wed Phyllis, this being the Lord Chancellor's decision. He even fancies her himself, which is strictly against the rules! Phyllis turns down their approaches, pledging herself to Strephon.

Once again, Strephon's appeal to the Lord Chancellor is rejected, but his case is not helped when he is seen by the peers one evening talking with his mother. Being a fairy, she does not age, so appears to be just 17 years old!

The peers grab this opportunity to declare to Phyllis that Strephon is being unfaithful. Mad with him, she offers herself to either of the Lords Tolloller or Mountararat. Strephon summons the Fairy Queen to his aid. Infuriated by the peers, she declares that Strephon, by the power of fairy magic, will enter Parliament and pass any bill he proposes, crushing the power of the peers.

Act II

The fairies goad the peers about Strephon's power and they ask help from the fairies to limit Strephon's meddling in matters of state. But he is under the Queen's protection and they can do nothing, despite being much attracted to the peers – after which the Queen reminds them of the penalty for marrying a mortal!

Phyllis has yet to decide which lord to marry and leaves it to them to decide. With a duel to the death in prospect, Tolloller and Mountararat agree that both will renounce their claims: they have always been close friends, and that is more important to them than the love of Phyllis.

The Lord Chancellor enters dressed for bed but suffering insomnia as he too is desperately in love with Phyllis. Mountararat and Tolloller even encourage him to take her hand.

Meanwhile, Strephon is still heartbroken and speaks to his mother. It turns out that she was married to the Chancellor, who believes her dead, and does not know that Strephon is his son. Iolanthe is forbidden from speaking to the Chancellor on pain of death, but never-the-less reveals herself to him to appeal on behalf of Strephon and Phyllis. She now has to face death at the hands of the Fairy Queen ...

Is there a reprieve and a happy ending? Will the Lord Chancellor come up with a legal solution? All will be discovered in the final scene!



Director's note

Our production begins with a performance in a village hall of a fairy dance set to music from the *lolanthe* overture. This is used as an excuse for the women of the village to don fairy garb and play at being fairies themselves. Before anyone knows it, the women are performing their way through the opera and everyone who enters the hall is charmed into joining in. There's no need to stop, because Gilbert's tale is so compelling and the women are fully entertained both by their own excuse to become fairies and also at seeing the men of the village band and cricket team act out the antics of the story's joyous dig at the British aristocracy.

Gilbert's *Iolanthe* is about "sky-high" Fairyland and down-to-earth Britain. The conflicts of these diverse worlds are the same: the inhabitants of both are governed by their duty, and their duty is to the Law – the Law of Fairyland or the Law of the Land. What brings these worlds together is the love of two couples. Iolanthe, an immortal, met her lover when he was a young man and she a fairy of ... about 200 years. Now it's 25 years on, and their offspring – whose struggle is compounded by being governed by both worlds – finds himself in love with a mortal. The problem for the mother is that the Law of Fairyland forbids marriage to a mortal and the problem for the son is that the Law of the Land forbids him to marry his love unless he can up his career status – he's only a poor (but decorative) shepherd lad, and there are many men of the highest station for him to compete with.

The theme throughout *Iolanthe* is that happiness could be achieved if it were not for the strictness of the Law. All the characters have difficulties with this, but the law officers – the Fairy Queen and the Lord Chancellor – especially struggle with enacting the Law. If only a way could be found to relax the Law! In playing out these conflicts and resolutions in the quiet intimacy of the village hall, perhaps our villagers learn something important about themselves, that adhering to the Law for its own sake is not enough to achieve the love and happiness they desire. Acting their way through *Iolanthe* produces a magical transformation, and all skip home unreasonably happy. After all, it's Love and not the Law that makes the world go round!



Moving back to Fife in 2015, she joined DGASS and has been in several shows, initially in the chorus before playing Isabel in *The Pirates of Penzance* last year.

Happiest singing mezzo-soprano, Sharon returned to KGASS, playing Lady Saphir in *Patience '68* in 2019, and Vittoria in *The Gondoliers* in 2020, and also performed with Kirkcaldy Amateur Dramatic Society playing the club singer in *Made in Dagenham* in 2023. She will be returning for *Elf The Musical* in November 2024.

Michael Enright spent most of his working life in uniform, first as a police officer, and after retirement as an auxiliary nurse, but never thought he'd be wearing a bearskin! Proud to call himself a "Scot by marriage" (although actually Irish!) he lives in Kinghorn with wife Fiona, who also sings with the Society. This will be Michael's first principal part with DGASS, although he is no stranger to Savoy Operas, having appeared as Dr Daly in *The Sorcerer* and Pish-Tush in *The Mikado*, in his former home town of Swindon.

Beyond the world of G&S, Michael has sung many principal roles including Baron Zeta in Franz Lehár's *The Merry Widow* and Belcore in Donizetti's *L'Elisir d'Amore*, and has performed as bass soloist in oratorio and other works including Handel's *Messiah* and Mozart's *Requiem*. Whilst reading history at the University of Oxford, Michael was awarded a choral bursary to the chapel choir of Pembroke College. Michael also sang semi-professionally in the BBC Symphony Chorus for fifteen years, and currently sings in the choir of Dunfermline Abbey.

Angie Fowler first performed with DGASS as Edith in our 2023 production of *The Pirates of Penzance*, and is pleased to be back this year playing Leila.

Angie has been in the amateur dramatics scene in Edinburgh since 2015, mostly with Edinburgh G&S, joining the ensemble for *South Pacific, Me and My Girl, Oklahoma!*, *Jesus Christ Superstar, Carousel* and *The Mikado*. She joined Captivate Theatre as Mrs Bedwin for their Edinburgh Fringe production of *Oliver!* in 2022 and was in their ensemble for *Sunshine on Leith* in 2023.

She does ongoing work with the Edinburgh-based 'Let's Face the Music and Dance' theatre group, which works for the support of Leukaemia Care and other charities.

2024 will see her debut with Threepenny Theatricals when she takes on the role of Gabrielle in their production of Rogers and Hammerstein's *Cinderella* which will stage at the Church Hill Theatre in Edinburgh next November.

Liz Landsman first performed on stage during her student days at St Andrews where she discovered a love of the Savoy operas. Three years with the Angus G&S Society followed, after which she moved to Edinburgh, where she played many mezzo roles with Edinburgh G&S, including the title role in *Iolanthe*, Lady Angela in *Patience*, Tessa in *The* Gondoliers, Psyche in Princess Ida and Mad Margaret in Ruddygore.

Her first role with DGASS was as the Duchess of Plaza-Toro in The Gondoliers in 2016, since when she has played several alto principal parts. In 2023 Liz was delighted to be back in the Carnegie Hall as Ruth in *The Pirates of Penzance*, and also joined the cast of Threepenny Theatricals as the eccentric Rose Flood Porter in *The Lady Vanishes*.

At weekends Liz can be found participating in dog agility and Hoopers shows with her border collies Rue and Alta, or standing for hours on CalMac ferries as a Marine Mammal Surveyor for the charity, Orca.

Jennifer Murray-Smith has been a

G&S principal since the age of 17. When studying at the University of St Andrews, she played multiple principal soprano roles with St Andrews G&S, Peak Opera in Buxton and Edinburgh Fringe company Happy-Go-Lucky Theatre, and more recently was Yum-Yum in The Mikado and Hebe in HMS Pinafore with Edinburgh G&S. Achieving a LLCM in performance in 2016, her operatic roles include Lucia in The Rape of Lucretia, Susan in A Dinner Engagement, and Lady Milhouse in The Minister with the Byre Opera Company. Recent oratorio engagements include Faure's Requiem and Monteverdi's Vespers.

Jennifer is also experienced in musical theatre playing The Baker's Wife in Into the Woods, Lucy in The Threepenny Opera and Sarah Brown in Guys and Dolls. Last year she played Annie with Forest Theatre Company and made her first appearance with us as Mabel in Jennifer Murray-Smith The Pirates of Penzance. When not singing, Jennifer can be found at Glasgow Caledonian University where she is a lecturer in Marketing.

Robin Ożóg is one of the founder members of DGASS and a favourite with our audiences. Over the years he has played all the major tenor and romantic lead roles in G&S (many several times over!). Outwith G&S, Robin has performed in many Societies in Fife, Lothian, Forth Valley and Tayside. He has played Danilo in The Merry Widow, Alfred and Falke in *Pink Champagne*, Eisenstein in *Die Fledermaus*, Brazil, Raoul and Robert in La Vie Parisienne, Pluto in Orpheus in the Underworld, and many other leading roles. More recently Robin played the part of Ko-Ko in The Mikado, Archibald Grosvenor in Patience, Jack Point in The Yeomen of the Guard, Sir Despard Murgatroyd in Ruddigore and Sir Marmaduke Pointdextre in The Sorcerer.

In our 2018 production of *The Mikado*, Robin played the part of Katisha, probably one of the first productions ever where the genders of those performing the parts of Katisha and Ko-Ko were swapped. Robin is currently directing Kirkcaldy G&S in their forthcoming production of *The Mikado* when he will star once again as Ko-Ko.

Michael Scott loves working in all aspects of theatre. He had a successful career as a dancer, beginning with London City Ballet and Scottish Ballet. Highlights include tap-dancing as a bellhop in English National Opera's *The Mikado*; Cossack dancing at Princess Diana's fund-raising party held at her family home, Spencer House; flamenco dancing in the world's largest production of *Carmen* with José Carreras; and knocking both Carreras and Placido Domingo to the floor of the stage of the Royal Opera House.

Over the past ten years, Michael has been involved in Scotland's thriving amateur scene including choreographing for Fife Opera, singing Perchik in SLO's *Fiddler on the Roof* and General Deelah in EDGAS's *Cups and Saucers*. He also acted in Edinburgh Grad's two-hander that won the 2018 week-long One-Act Play competition at Edinburgh's Church Hill Theatre. Before Covid lockdown he played Bunthorne in the Kirkcaldy G&S production of *Patience* and directed and designed the Aristophanes Greek comedy *Women in Parliament* before working as choreographer

and movement director of Opera Bohemia's *Merry Widow*, which had an 18-venue tour of Scotland. *Iolanthe* is Michael's first production with DGASS as director following his performance as Major-General Stanley in last year's *The Pirates of Penzance*.

David Thomson was introduced to G&S with the University of St Andrews Gilbert and Sullivan Society, where he performed as Bunthorne in *Patience* in 2007 and Strephon in *Iolanthe* the following year. David has continued to enjoy performing G&S with Peak Opera at the International Gilbert and Sullivan Festival, with recent credits including Antonio in *The Gondoliers*, Sir Marmaduke in *The Sorcerer* and Scynthius in *Princess Ida*. David will be rejoining Peak Opera later this year, once more as Strephon in *Iolanthe*.

Outside G&S, David appeared in the 2023 Perth Festival of the Arts with Scots Opera Project in the Celtic folk opera, *The Seal Woman*.

David is most regularly found performing as a soloist with the Jambouree Choir and Cabaret Singers in Perth, enjoying singing an eclectic selection of pieces from opera, musicals, Scots and other popular music. Since joining the choir in 2017, David has performed in many seasonal concerts as well as appearing on the BBC's Christmas Eve programme, *Christmas Celebration* in 2019.

When not singing or at work, Caroline enjoys the great outdoors, whether this is locally on her allotment or travelling across Scotland to enjoy its wild places.







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
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
